Executive Summary

The presentation provides an overview of the planned approach to the review of the <u>Standards of conduct, performance and ethics</u> and associated guidance. It discusses the purpose of the review, the activities expected to be carried out – including stakeholder engagement – the proposed timeline and the expected the scope of the review.

Decision	ETC are asked to reflect upon the proposed approach to the review of the Standards of conduct, performance and ethics and to set out their perspective on the proposed approach and advise of any potential concerns.
Next steps	Following discussion with ETC, the presentation will be delivered to Council in July. Following stakeholder engagement, a draft consultation document will be presented to ETC in September.
Strategic priority	Strategic priority 2: enable our professions to meet our standards so they can adapt to changes in health and care practice delivery, preventing harm to service users.
	Strategic priority 4: we regulate, take and communicate decisions which are informed by a deep understanding of the environment within which our registrants, employers and education providers operate.
Financial and resource implications	Any additional resource or financial implications associated with this work will be discussed at a later stage in the planning process.

EDI impact

The Standards of conduct, performance and ethics will impact HCPC processes and our stakeholders. Included in the planned activity is the completion of a detailed EIA and continuous consideration of the possible impact of any proposed changes to any person with protected characteristics.

Recap: SCPEs

The SCPEs set out, in general terms, how we expect our registrants to behave.

They outline what the public should expect from their health and care professional.

They help us to make decisions about the character of professionals who apply to our Register.

They are used if someone raises a concern about a registrant's practice. When things go wrong, they help us to decide whether it is necessary to take action.

Recap: recent changes to HCPC Standards of proficiency

Common Standards


In March 2022, Council approved new Standards of proficiency for all of our professions. These will become effective on 1 September 2023 for all of our registrants. The Standards of proficiency set the level that registrants need to meet at the point they join the register.

Each of our professions' Standards have changed in different ways, but all of our professions now have a shared set of common Standards of proficiency which they must meet.

The common Standards have been changed in seven key ways

Common Standards

EDI

- Significant expansion in the number of Standards relating to EDI
- New duties to understand unconscious bias and intersectional impacts

Promote public health

 Like other health and care professionals, registrants play a proactive role in promoting good health

Service user involvement

- Helping service users play an active role in their own health
- A more developed understanding of consent



Recap: recent changes to HCPC Standards of proficiency

Common Standards

Health and FTP

- Registrants need to understand how their mental health may impact on their ability to practise.
- A compassionate approach to regulation

Technology

- Registrants need to understand how to use new technology in the delivery of care.
- Understand that new technology comes with new risks, including confidentiality.

Leadership

- Leadership is not just about management
- All registrants are autonomous professionals and understand the importance of leadership

Active wording

- New wording throughout the Standards makes clear that registrants need to do more than understand the importance of their Standards.
- Registrants are autonomous professionals






Proposed activities of SCPEs review – pre consultation

•SOPs HCPC to support with planning and implementation of programme revisions


1 September 2023: SOPs in force for all registrants











- Providers start to supply information for HCPC to review planned programme changes from February 2023 (portfolio based submissions)
- HCPC to support with planning and delivery. Institutions subject to approval process will be assessed





Academic year 3 (2023/24)

Providers to deliver approved programmes for learners starting in Sept 2023

•Incorporation of the revised Standards will be assessed via performance review process (ongoing)
